- the branch of linguistics that deals with syntax and morphology, sometimes also phonology and semantics



Grammar Adverbs of manner

<i>adjective</i>	→		<i>adverb</i>
------------------	---	--	---------------

He is *slow*. → He does things *slowly*.
She is *noisy*. → She does things *noisily*.

- We use *very*, *really* and *so* before adjectives and adverbs.

He is *very/really/so careful*.
→ He does things *very/really/so carefully*.

- Some adverbs are the same as the adjectives: *hard, fast, right, wrong, early, late*
- The adverb for *good* is *well*.
